	<b>Informational</b> Informational text, often seen in textbooks, brochures and websites, instructs the audience about a topic using clear, accessible language. Factual.	<b>Non-Fiction</b> A nonfiction narrative, such as a personal essay or biography, uses storytelling devices such as character, plot and description to tell about a person's life or a significant event. Factual.	<b>Literature</b> Written works of fiction Not factual.	<b>Form of Text</b> Poem, article, textbook, essay, novel, brochure, government document, etc.
